



On The Water

Paddle sports bring Suir Blueway Tipperary to life. From casual kayaking or stand-up paddle boarding on a meandering river, to an exhilarating ride down rapids, there are options to suit all levels along 53km of paddling experiences and trails. See the map overleaf for details.

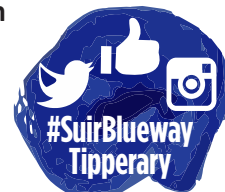
Proficient paddlers: If you are experienced and used to independent travel on the water, Suir Blueway Tipperary provides a range of trails from Cahir to Carrick-on-Suir. Start at beautiful Cahir Castle, paddle past the romantic Swiss Cottage and on to Ardfinnan and Newcastles. Further downstream, more accomplished paddlers can take on the challenge of the 300-metre whitewater Canoe Slalom Course in Clonmel, a training base for the Irish team. Paddle on towards Kilsheelan, enjoying mostly flat waters and terrific scenery all the way to Carrick-on-Suir.



Novices: Canoeing skills programmes are organised regularly by Tipperary Sports Partnership, and inexperienced canoeists and kayakers are advised to use a local qualified guide to arrange an unforgettable day that is both thrilling and safe.

Be aware: There are many places to launch canoes, kayaks and paddle boards along Suir Blueway Tipperary, however, the river can be fast-flowing and paddlers should be conscious of the conditions when launching. Inexperienced paddlers should only take to the water under the supervision of qualified guides.

Walking Trails

Savour the simple serenity of Suir Blueway Tipperary on foot. Experience the sights and sounds of nature during a riverbank ramble, explore some of Ireland's most fascinating medieval castles and heritage sites, or take on some of the waymarked trails of the East Munster Way. There are walks to suit everyone in the family.

The Butler Trail

Discover the incredible 800-year history of one of Ireland's most influential families. Learn about their rise to power and how they help shape Irish history. Explore a house built for a queen at Ormond Castle, the romantic riverside Swiss Cottage, spot the cannonball in the walls of Cahir Castle, or simply delight in the restored former courthouse at the Main Guard. The Butler Trail runs the length of Suir Blueway Tipperary – from Cahir to Clonmel and Carrick-on-Suir – and includes heritage trails in each town.

Stop 1: Cahir 1 2

Start at imposing Cahir Castle and explore Inch field before joining the tree lined Coronation Walk for two kilometres alongside the gently flowing river to romantic Swiss Cottage. Return to Cahir and enjoy exploring the pleasant sights and streetscapes of this picturesque town.

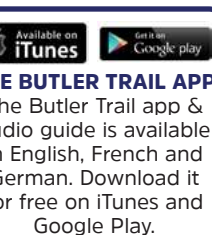


Stop 2: Clonmel 6

The bustling town of Clonmel offers visitors an opportunity to step back from the banks of the river and explore centuries of Tipperary history. The Butler Trail takes in historical buildings including the Main Guard, the West Gate in the town walls, and the Franciscan Friary. Allow 1-2 hours.

Stop 3: Carrick-on-Suir 11

The medieval market town where the Butler Family grew to power in the 13th century. Visit exquisite Ormond Castle, the Tudor manor house Thomas 'Black Tom' Butler built for the anticipated visit of his cousin Elizabeth I of England. It is one of 10 Butler Trail stops in the town which also includes the beautiful stained glass and Kilkenny marble columns of St Nicholas's Church.



Clonmel to Kilsheelan

17.7km 7 8 9

A more testing hike. Starting at the Gashouse Bridge in Clonmel, walk along the river until you reach Sir Thomas's Bridge, cross the bridge and leave the Blueway to follow the waymarked route of the East Munster Way into the foothills of the Comeragh Mountains until it rejoins the Blueway at Kilsheelan Bridge.



Kilsheelan to Carrick-on-Suir

11.5km 9 10 11

Follow in the footsteps of merchants and tradesmen who made their living along this 17th-Century towpath. Take in beautiful bridges, castles and churches set in picturesque countryside – but keep your eyes peeled for wildlife such as otters and herons.

Castles and Conquests

Immerse yourself in stories from before you can remember – of people, places and experiences through time which shaped a landscape that served as the main gateway to the centre of Ireland through the ages.

Cahir Castle 1

Once the stronghold of the Butler family, this imposing castle (below) dates from the 12th Century. There's an excellent audio-visual show and guided tours for visitors to learn about the pivotal role Cahir Castle (below) played in important periods in Irish history. *Castle St, Cahir, Co Tipperary*



Swiss Cottage 2

This wonderfully romantic 200-year-old gentry's folly was where lords and ladies spent long summer days at leisure. Discover more from your guide about the various architectural and design curiosities of the cottage including specially-made furnishings, hand-painted murals and what was once some of the most expensive wallpaper in the world. *Castle Park, Carrick-on-Suir, Co Tipperary*

St Patrick's Well 5

This beautiful natural well is a great location to relax and enjoy a picnic. The waters from the well flow into a big shallow pond, with an ancient stone cross on a little island in the middle. The site also has a stone statue of St. Patrick, who is said to have baptised some locals in the natural spring water. *Gortmore, Co Tipperary*



The Main Guard 6

Built as a courthouse in 1675, this beautiful building (above) hosted King James II as he toured Ireland. A five-minute walk from the Blueway at Suir Island, The Main Guard building was redeveloped in 1810 when shops were incorporated into the ground floor before it was expertly restored at the turn of the last century and won a Heritage Award for Best Practice in Conservation. *Sarsfield Street, Clonmel, Co Tipperary*

Ormond Castle 11

When the 3rd Earl of Ormond, 'Black' Tom Butler, spent time at the court of his cousin Queen Elizabeth I in the 16th Century, he was so inspired by the architecture he encountered that he decided to add a Tudor manor house to the original Ormond Castle. It remains the finest example of an Elizabethan manor house in Ireland, with features that include some of the most marvellously decorative plasterwork in the country. A 10-minute walk from the end of the Blueway. *Castle Park, Carrick-on-Suir, Co Tipperary*

Craft Granary 1

The Craft Granary is a beautifully restored 19th-century grain store in Cahir which acts as a showcase for quality handcrafted items from the South East of Ireland. *Church Street, Cahir, Co Tipperary*

Tipperary County Museum 6

Discover the fascinating story of the people and places of Tipperary through the ages. There's a rare copy of Oliver Cromwell's death mask alongside hundreds of other religious, social history, political, archaeological, sports and industrial artefacts. A 10-minute walk from the Blueway at Suir Island. Admission is free. Closed for refurbishment until late summer 2019, please check www.tipperary.com for updates. *Mick Delahunty Square, Clonmel, Co Tipperary*



South Tipperary Arts Centre 6

Immerse yourself in a mixture of visual arts, performing arts, music and literature all housed in a beautiful, light-filled modernist building near the River Suir. This centre of excellence for the arts also houses exhibitions & screenings and a variety of classes and workshops. *Nelson St, Clonmel, Co Tipperary*

Carrick-on-Suir Heritage Centre 11

Housed in a former church, the heritage centre contains numerous local artefacts and photographs from a town that is central to the story of one of Ireland's most powerful families, the Butlers. Closed for refurbishment until late 2019, please check www.tipperary.com for updates. *Main Street, Carrick-On-Suir, Co Tipperary*

Tudor Artisan Hub 11

An Aladdin's Cave of creative treasures packed with unique 'one-off' products hand-crafted by an eclectic collective of more than 50 local artists and other creative people. *42 Main St, Carrick-On-Suir, Co Tipperary*

Cycling is the perfect way to explore the river trails, towns and spectacular countryside along Suir Blueway Tipperary. Bring the family for a gentle pedal by the river, stop to refuel at one of the charming cafés, restaurants or picnic areas.

There is a 21km marked cycle route along the river towpath from Clonmel to Carrick-on-Suir which is ideal for leisure cyclists of all abilities. The route is divided into four stages so you can decide on the distance yourself. Pick your route on the map overleaf.

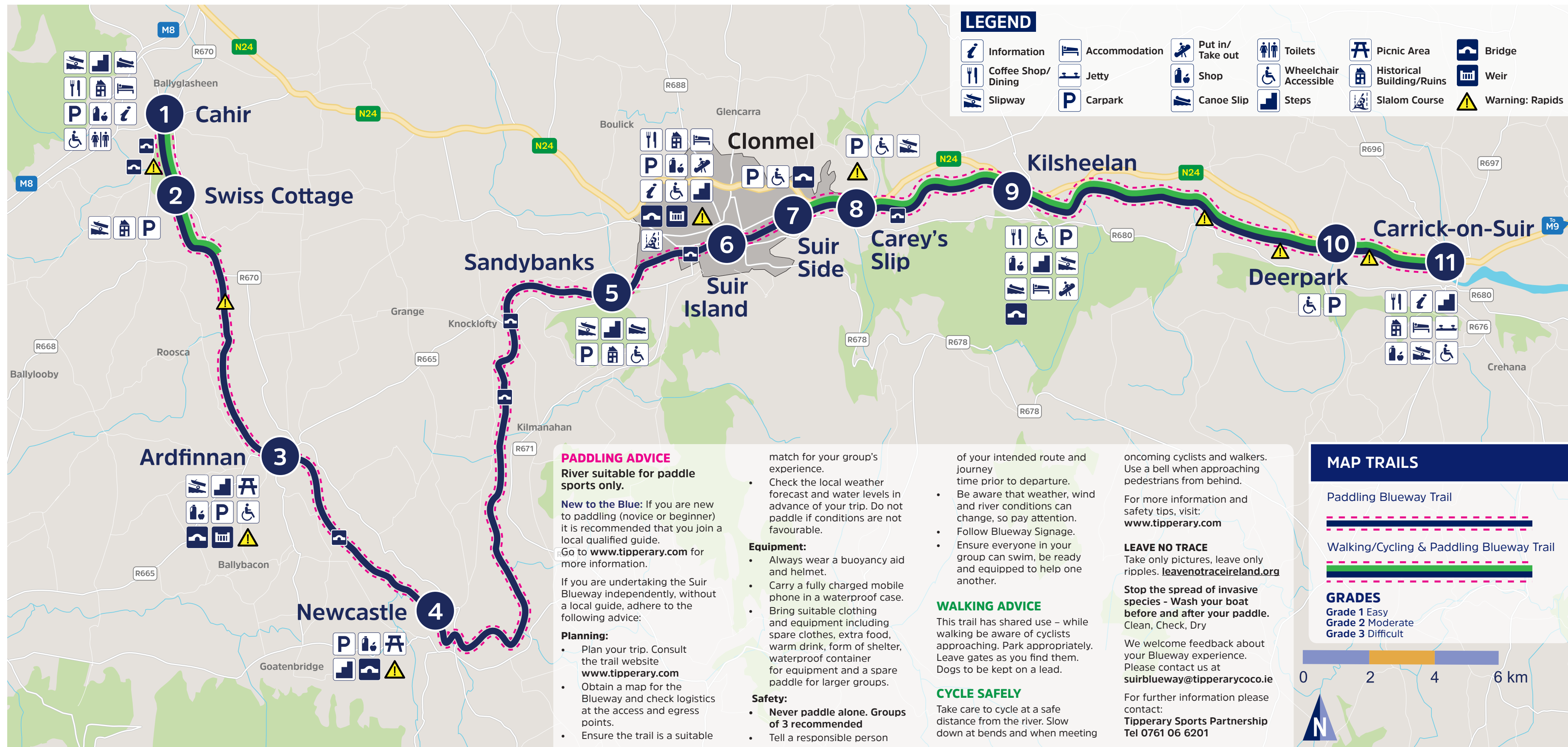
