

From medieval castles to mountain views, Tipperary is home to a rich variety of iconic attractions. This section highlights some of the must-see experiences - places that capture the spirit, beauty and history of the destination. Whether you are a first-time visitor or a returning adventurer, there's something here to inspire you.

1 Brú Ború Cashel, E25 YE89

062-61122 Open year round bruboru.ie



Located at the foot of the Rock of Cashel, Brú Ború is a cultural hub and heritage centre featuring a theatre. craft shop. Sounds of History exhibition, genealogy suite, and conference facilities. As an affiliate of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann, visitors can eniov live performances of traditional music, song, and dance during the summer. Explore the depth of Irish culture and heritage at Brú Ború.

2 Cahir Castle

One of Ireland's best-preserved medieval fortresses. Cahir Castle sits on an island in the River Suir with high walls and towers. For centuries the home to the Butlers. Barons of Cahir, this castle witnessed many rivalries, rebellions, and conquests. Guided tours reveal these stories and the castle's impressive defences, which remained impregnable until artillery was used against it in 1599.

3 Cashel Folk **Village**

This museum offers an immersive journey into Irish history through its collection of artefacts and exhibits including a 1916 Easter Rising Garden of Remembrance and a beautifully preserved 19th century Gypsy caravan which housed a family of 16. Each exhibit provides a vivid journey through Ireland's past, reflecting the resilience and hardships that shaped the nation from the Irish Famine to the War of Independence.

4 Cashel Heritage Centre

Located on Cashel's Main Street, the Heritage Centre displays a large-scale model of Cashel in the 1640s, revealing the town's hidden historical treasures. Visitors can view the Charters of Cashel, signed by King Charles II in 1663 and King James II in 1687. Free maps and tourist information are available, along with assistance for accommodation and bookings.

Showcasing a vast private

collection of rural memorabilia spanning three centuries. Explore a dairy with a traditional creamery lab, a tinsmith's workshop, and recreated spaces like a pub, shop, schoolroom, and farmhouse kitchen, Discover tools of carpenters, cobblers. wheelwrights, and blacksmiths, brought to life through guided tours.

6 Dove Hill Shopping Village

Dove Hill Shopping Village, just outside Carrick-on-Suir, blends heritage and modern retail. Formerly the Tipperary Crystal production plant, it celebrates a rich history of craftsmanship. Established in 1988, Tipperary Crystal became renowned for hand-cut crystal. Today, the site is a vibrant destination featuring Blarney Woollen Mills, Meadows & Byrne, Jilly & Joe's café, and an array of fashion, homeware, and lifestyle stores.

7 Fethard **Horse Country Experience**

This interactive museum explores 2,000 years of history, delving into the relationship between the people, the land, and the horse. Visitors can enjoy a journey through stories and heritage tied to equestrian culture. Housed in a historic building dating back to the 1600s, it has served as an almshouse, town hall, and marketplace. The museum is also the booking point for Coolmore Stud Farm tours.

TIME TO VISIT

8 Glen of **Aherlow**

The Glen of Aherlow is a lush valley offering endless opportunities for walking, cycling, horse riding, and fishing, Enjoy local hospitality in its restaurants, pubs and accommodations. Visit Christ the King statue, explore the family-friendly Nature Park, and discover ancient sites like St Pecaun's Holy Well. For adventurers, the Galtee Mountains await, boasting five stunning corrie lakes.

9 Holvcross **Abbey**

Holycross, E41PH01 086-166 5869 Open year round holycrossabbey.ie



Holycross Abbey, a restored medieval Cistercian monastery on the banks of the River Suir. was founded by Dónal Mór Ó Briain, King of Limerick, in 1182 AD. It houses the relic of the True Cross, drawing pilgrims since its inception. The Butlers of Ormond carried out major renovations around 1400 AD, including the enshrinement of the Ormond Relic. Many unique architectural features date back to the 15th century rebuild.

10 John Hanly & Co Woollen Mills

Nenagh, E45 P789 067–24278 Open year round johnhanly.com



Since 1893, John Hanly & Co Woollen Mills has been weaving tradition and quality at Ballyartella, near Nenagh. Located by the Nenagh River, the mill's factory shop offers luxurious throws, blankets, scarves, and fashionable Irish caps and hats. Visitors can enjoy an enriched retail experience while learning about the history, heritage, and ongoing story of this family-run weaving enterprise.

Littleton Labyrinth

The Littleton Labyrinth is an 8km (5mile) trail along a former Bord na Móna rail track, blending rich ecclesiastical heritage with peatland biodiversity. Starting in the Slieveardagh Hills near Killenaule, it crosses Littleton Bog and continues to Horse and Jockey. The route includes part of the Derrynaflan Loop, church sites, holy wells, and sacred places with scenic beauty and history spanning 15 centuries.

Littleton Labyrinth is km (5mile) trail along mer Bord na Móna rack, blending rich esiastical heritage with and biodiversity. Starting es Slieveardagh Hills near

Nenagh Castle, the town's oldest building, dates back to the 13th century. Built by Theobald FitzWalter, it served as the main seat of the Butler family until 1391. The castle features Ireland's finest cylindrical keep, incorporated into the curtain walls of a five-sided courtyard.

19 Rock of Cashel

Cashel, E25 KX44 062–61437 Open year round heritageireland.ie



With the most impressive cluster of medieval buildings in Ireland, among its monuments are a round tower, high cross, Romanesque chapel, Gothic cathedral, and a 15th century tower house. Originally the seat of the Kings of Munster, St. Patrick is said to have converted King Aenghus here. Highlights include Cormac's Chapel, home to the only surviving Romanesque frescoes in Ireland.

11 Killaloe River Cruises

The one hour guided tours of the River Shannon and Lough Derg offer breathtaking scenery and engaging commentary on notable landmarks. Sail past Beal Boru, Brian Boru's historic stronghold, and learn about the Killaloe Canal and the Shannon Scheme of 1929. Enjoy stunning views, framed by the Slieve Bernagh and Arra Mountains, aboard a modern, purpose-built boat with seating both indoor and out.

14 Mitchelstown Cave

Discovered in 1833,
Mitchelstown Cave is a large and
complex cave system. Although
the entrance to the cave is
modest, the subterranean
world will take your breath
away by its sheer scale and
depth. Guided tours follow
ancient passageways, exploring
cathedral-sized caverns adorned
with dripstone formations,
stalactites, stalagmites and huge
calcite columns, explaining the
history and geology of the cave.

17 Nenagh Heritage Centre

The Nenagh Heritage and Genealogy Centre offers a glimpse into the area's past. Originally part of a gaol complex, the Centre showcases local history, including the condemned cells used for executions between 1842 and 1858, with an opportunity to walk in the footsteps of past prisoners. After the gaol's closure in 1887, the buildings were repurposed by the Sisters of Mercy for education.

20 Roscrea Castle, Gardens and Damer House / Black Mills

the 13th century stone castle featuring a gate tower, curtain walls, and corner towers.

Damer House, an 18th century pre-Palladian residence, boasts elegant architecture, including nine bay windows and period furnishings. It also houses Damer House Gallery, a contemporary art gallery. The grounds also feature an impressive garden, a restored mill, and St. Crónán's high cross and pillar stone.

12 Lár na Páirce

Lár na Páirce is the first museum dedicated to Gaelic Games. Located in Thurles, the birthplace of the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA), it houses Ireland's oldest collection of Gaelic Games heritage. Exhibitions cover hurling, Gaelic football, handball, camogie, hurley making, sports broadcasting, and the Sam Melbourne Collection of GAA memorabilia.

15 Nenagh Arts Centre

Nenagh Arts Centre is a vibrant arts space that presents an ambitious multi-disciplinary programme of events. The centre aims to enhance both individual and community wellbeing through its diverse offerings. With a 194-seater theatre and studio spaces, check the website to see what events or exhibitions are taking place. The centre also houses the beautiful Nenagh Tourist Information Centre.

18 Ormond Castle Carrick-on-Suir, E32 CX59 051–640 787 Open year round heritageireland.ie



Ormond Castle is the finest example of an Elizabethan manor house in Ireland. Built in 1565 by Thomas, 10th Earl of Ormond, in honour of Queen Elizabeth, the castle features a magnificent great hall adorned with exquisite stucco plasterwork, including portraits of Queen Elizabeth and Edward VI. Audiovisuals and technological installations bring its history to life.

21 South Tipperary Arts Centre

Founded to be the focal point for the arts in Clonmel and South Tipperary, the South Tipperary Arts Centre brings both national and international arts to the region. It enhances engagement and opportunities for arts practitioners, audiences, and visitors. The centre features exhibitions, workshops, and events.

22 Swiss Cottage

Cahir, E21 DX07 046–940 7005 Open seasonally heritageireland.ie



Built in 1810 for Richard and Emily Butler, the 1st Earl and Countess of Glengall, Swiss Cottage is a beautiful example of Cottage Orné architecture, possibly designed by John Nash. This fanciful cottage, ideal at the time for picnics and garden parties, features elegant rooms inspired by nature. With its picturesque charm and unique style, it's a hidden gem worth visiting.

25 Thomas MacDonagh Museum

Cloughjordan, E53 EV29 0505–42785 Open year round macdonaghmuseum.ie



The Thomas MacDonagh Museum, located in Cloughjordan village, focuses on the life and legacy of Thomas MacDonagh, Tipperary's signatory of the Irish Proclamation. The museum delves into his role in the 1916 Rising, as well as his personal life as a family man, teacher, poet, dramatist, and Gaelic language activist. The museum features a dynamic programme of exhibitions.

Explore Lough Derg's outdoor activities and heritage. Take a boat trip to enjoy the lake's views, or paddle along the Lough Derg Blueway with its 160km of trails. Anglers will find fishing for trout, pike, and salmon, with boat rentals on offer. Walk the Lough Derg Way, connecting picturesque towns and villages or bring the family for a host of water activities. Don't miss the historic Lorrha and pretty Terryglass.

23 The Main Guard

Clonmel, E91 P7Y8 052–612 7484 Open seasonally heritageireland.ie



In the 17th century, County Tipperary was a palatinate ruled by James Butler, Duke of Ormond, who built this courthouse in Clonmel. Later repurposed as a barracks, it became known as the Main Guard. The two-storey building, inspired by Sir Christopher Wren, has been recently restored. Its open arcade of sandstone columns hosts regular exhibitions and events.

26 Tipperary Excel Centre

The Tipperary Excel Centre is a centre for arts, culture, and heritage. Its diverse facilities include the Simon Ryan Theatre, Art Gallery, Cinema, café and a Heritage Centre with Tourist Information. The Tipperary Family History Research Centre provides genealogical search services. Visitors can explore permanent exhibitions on the War of Independence and enjoy the annual Heritage Festival.

The Source Arts Centre offers a diverse, year-round programme of cultural events, including theatre, music, comedy, dance, cinema, and children's theatre. The centre features a 250-seat theatre, visual art gallery, and community studio space.

Ballina-Killaloe 52.80921, -8.43741



The twin towns are linked by a 13-arch bridge across the River Shannon. With the Arra Mountains of Tipperary to the East and Clare's highest peak Moylussa to the west, this is the perfect base for hiking, water sports, cycling, or relaxing in one of the many eateries. Enjoy the Bridges walk with a playground and outdoor swimming pool; a cycle and foot path to nearby Birdhill; and historic landmarks St. Flannan's Cathedral: Brian Ború Fort.

Cahir 52.37461, -7.92520 visitcahir.ie




Cahir is known for its rich history and landmarks. Explore Cahir Castle, set on an island in the River Suir, and visit the Blind Piper Statue, honouring Uileann player Edward Keating Hyland. Discover heritage sites like St. Paul's Church with its Sensory Garden, and Cahir Presbyterian Church, while enjoying the variety of shops and cafés. Outdoor enthusiasts can explore parks and trails, including Inch Field and the Coronation Walk.

Carrick-on-Suir 52.34527, -7.41095



One of seven medieval walled towns in Tipperary, Carrick-on-Suir was originally located on the northern banks of the River Suir, with remnants of the town walls, including the West Gate, still visible. Influenced by the Butler family, the town features Ormond Castle and the charming Old Bridge from 1447. The Sean Healy Park offers access to the Suir Blueway, ideal for walking, cycling or paddling.

Cashel 52.51828, -7.88605



Once the seat of the Kings of Munster, the historic Rock of Cashel is home to the most impressive group of medieval buildings in Ireland. Explore the 13th century ruins of Hore Abbey, visit Cashel Folk Museum, follow the High King's Loop, the Bishop's Walk, or the heritage trail to Bolton Library, the old city wall, and more. Enjoy the variety of shops and cafés while you discover the rich history of Cashel.

Clonmel

As Tipperary's largest town, Clonmel offers a vibrant mix of heritage, shopping, and outdoor activities. Browse boutiques, enjoy the cafés and restaurants, or explore sites like the Main Guard in the town centre, or Saint Patrick's Well, a couple of kilometres outside the town, situated in a sheltered valley with the sound of water echoing all around. It is said that St. Patrick and St. Declan first met at this tranquil site 1,600 years ago. With its ruined church and cross in the centre of the artificial lake, it is a beautiful mix of ancient heritage and modern landscaping.

Outdoor enthusiasts can enjoy the Suir Blueway or East Munster Way, or the Multi-purpose sports facility on the edge of town, built on a 1.88-hectare site, incorporating athletics tracks; playground with zip wires, skatepark, a cycle (pump) track and a 1km walking trail. The town also hosts an array of lively festivals, celebrating local culture and creativity.


Cloughjordan 52.94295, -8.03834



Set in rolling countryside and brimming with history and charm, visit the Thomas MacDonagh Museum, explore Ireland's first ecovillage, and take a self-guided heritage tour. Enjoy the variety of shops, studios and cafés, stroll through Knockanacree Wood and Scohaboy Bog, and visit the community farm. Don't miss the Harry Clarke stained glass windows at the Catholic Church of Saints Michael and John.

Fethard

The medieval town wall, the most complete in Ireland, dates from 1292 when King Edward I of England provided the walls for protection. Fethard, surrounded by lush stud farms, is home to the world's top thoroughbred racehorses with a museum dedicated to the history of the horse. Explore the town's heritage, from historic buildings to equine roots, and get active in the town park, a vibrant hub for sport and recreation.

Nenagh

Nenagh is home to the imposing Nenagh Castle with its stunning walled garden. The market town offers a diverse range of shops, and artisan eateries. Visit the Nenagh Heritage Centre and the Nenagh Genealogy Centre, located in the former Gaol complex, and explore the exhibitions at the Nenagh Arts Centre and tourist information office. Journey to nearby Lough Derg and its pretty picturesque villages of Dromineer, Garrykennedy and Terryglass, popular with visitors, where one can enjoy lakeside bars, restaurants and a host of watersports and outdoor activities.

Roscrea

Roscrea, one of Ireland's oldest towns, grew around St Crónán's 7th century monastery. Explore remnants of its early history, including the impressive Round Tower, High Cross, and the Romanesque doorway of St Crónán's Church. Visit 13th century Roscrea Castle and the elegant Damer House, and stroll past the 15th century Franciscan Friary. This Heritage Town offers rich history, unique architecture, and a warm welcome.

'The Home of Hurling,' Thurles has a rich sporting heritage with the GAA founded here in 1884. Enjoy a hurling match at Semple Stadium, explore The Source Arts Centre, Lar na Pairce and tourist information centre, and experience a town that blends modern amenities and historic charm. Nearby Cabragh Wetlands (4km), a freshwater semi-natural floodplain habitats on the River Suir, with a variety of wildlife and paths, open year round.


Templemore is a town of ancient ruins and miracles, nestled at the foot of the Devil's Bit Mountain. Explore Templemore Town Park with its serene lakes and woodland walks. Discover historic sites like the Black Castle and the Church of the Sacred Heart. Known as the home of An Garda Síochána, Templemore blends history, nature, and community.

Loughmore 52.75640, -7.82962



Loughmore offers a glimpse into a cross-section of significant Irish history. Explore the ruins of the 13th century Augustinian Abbey, admire Loughmore Castle, once the seat of the Purcells, Barons of Loughmore. Visit the 19th century Cormack Memorial and The Old Mill, nestled by the River Suir. For a taste of local flavour, enjoy tea at the community-owned Cottage Shop and Tearooms.

Tipperary Town 52.47358. -8.16177



With panoramic views of the Galtee Mountains, 19th century architecture, iconic clock tower, heritage centre, charming shop fronts and cafés. On the edge of town stand the Tipperary Hills, a natural group of hills formed during the Ice Age; centuries of Anglo-Normans actions has left them with a fascinating story. Over 20 acres, featuring accessible trails, picnic areas, a Norman Motte, Heritage Trail, Pitch and Putt Course.

Lorrha

Once a thriving monastic centre, Lorrha boasts the remains of a 13th century friary, St. Ruadhan's Church, and connections to the famed Stowe Missal. Wander its quiet lanes, explore Redwood Castle nearby, and experience the charm of this village near Lough Derg.

Experience the excitement and tradition of horse racing at the county's three iconic venues. Tipperary Racecourse plays host to the sport at the highest level with both Graded National Hunt and Group Flat races. Clonmel Racecourse (Powerstown Park) is famed for its undulating National Hunt track, while Thurles Racecourse is known for its accessibility and intimate atmosphere.


